1 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Good morning. 2 I call the March 2nd, 2022 meeting of 3 the Philadelphia City Commissioners to 4 order. First, I will preserve the order 5 and decorum of these meetings. Everyone 6 in attendance should be on notice that 7 shouting out or interrupting the 8 proceedings will not be tolerated. 9 Those who violate this will be asked to 10 leave. The Sunshine Act permits anyone 11 attending a public meeting to object to 12 a perceived violation at any time during 13 the meeting. If you choose to do so, 14 please succinctly state your objection. 15 Objecting is not an opportunity for 16 speech making. Before we start, I would 17 like to recognize Commissioner Bluestein 18 to offer a few words. 19 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Thank you, 2.0 Madame Chairwoman. I would like to take 21 a moment to recognize the ongoing crisis 22 in Ukraine. My thoughts are with the 23 brave people of Ukraine as they defend 24 their country from invasion by Putin's

1	autocratic regime. This attack on
2	freedom and democracy in Ukraine is an
3	attack on freedom and democracy
4	everywhere, and we stand with them.
5	Thank you.
6	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Thank you,
7	Commissioner. We will now move to
8	public comment. Commenter shall state
9	where they live. If they are not a
10	resident of Philadelphia, that they are
11	a Philadelphia taxpayer. Public comment
12	is not an opportunity for dialogue or Q
13	and A. It is public comment, a chance
14	for you to tell us what you think. Each
15	speaker shall have two minutes; however,
16	I may extend this time at my discretion.
17	All public comments must be relevant or
18	germane to board business. Finally, it
19	is my responsibility to preserve the
20	order and decorum of the meetings. As
21	such, profane, slanderous,
22	discriminatory or personal attacks will
23	not be tolerated.
24	Is there anyone here this morning

1 to offer public comment? 2 MR. GARELLA: Yes. Good morning, 3 Commissioners. My name is Rich Garella. 4 I'm with Protect our Vote Philly. Thanks -- thanks for that statement, 5 6 Commissioner Bluestein. We're of course 7 in total agreement. 8 To stay on the topic of democracy, 9 a couple of weeks ago, the Chair Deeley 10 announced that there had been an 11 executive session on February 14th. I 12 wanted to point out, as we've pointed 13 out many times before, that the Sunshine 14 Act requires that the reasons for 15 executive sessions to be given -- and it 16 says in the Section 708, the reason for 17 holding the executive session must be 18 announced at the open meeting. 19 it's been ruled by Commonwealth Court in 2.0 Reading Eagle versus Reading Council 21 that the reasons for the executive 2.2 session have to be specific. Quote, 23 indicating a real discreet matter that 24 is best addressed in private. It means

1	you can't just give the legal excuse for
2	the executive session as you did;
3	meaning, meet with counsel to discuss
4	litigation. You've got to say what the
5	topic of the litigation is. If it's an
6	ongoing case, you've got to specify the
7	case. This is black-letter law, the
8	Commonwealth Court has decided. The
9	General Assembly wants the public to be
10	present at all meetings to witness the
11	deliberation. You can't use an
12	executive session to avoid that, and you
13	can't look as if you're using it to
14	avoid that. So the Commonwealth Court
15	said, the reason stated by the public
16	agency must be specific indicating a
17	real discreet matter that is best
18	addressed in private.
19	Now, I want to point out that
20	violating the Sunshine Act in this way
21	is a summary violation. It's a criminal
22	violation. There are money finds.
23	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Two minutes.
24	MR. GARELLA: There's possible

1	incarceration, and this is personal to						
2	each of you.						
3	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Two minutes.						
4	MR. GARELLA: It is not something						
5	that the Commission can provide legal						
6	support for. This is on you each. So						
7	please						
8	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Thank you.						
9	MR. GARELLA: rectify this						
10	problem in an open meeting such as this						
11	one. You have an opportunity to do it						
12	right now.						
13	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: We will now						
14	move to Commissioner Bluestein for						
15	emailed public comments.						
16	COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: As of 9:45						
17	a.m. this morning, there were no emailed						
18	public comments.						
19	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: We will now						
20	proceed to old business, and I will call						
21	on Joe Lynch to read the report from the						
22	Executive Director.						
23	MR. LYNCH: Good morning,						
24	Commissioners.						

1	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Good morning,
2	Joe.
3	MR. LYNCH: In today's Sunshine
4	Report, County Board for the Elections
5	Report, they are still awaiting for a
6	court order from the Pennsylvania
7	Supreme Court regarding the petition
8	signing calendar. Out of an abundance
9	of caution, the Philadelphia City
10	Commissioners have made petitions
11	available online at
12	PhiladelphiaVotes.com or in City Hall
13	Room 142. Candidates for Members of the
14	Democratic or Republican Ward Executive
15	Committee who wish to begin circulating
16	should be aware that the petition
17	calendar may change in the future,
18	possibly invalidating signatures that
19	have already been collected. Candidates
20	should consult an attorney for any legal
21	advice. The previously released
22	petitions from February 9th will be
23	accepted, though circulators should be
24	aware that the dates of circulation

printed on them are no longer valid, and that signatures collected before the date specified by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court will not count.

The County Board are currently accepting absentee and mail-in ballot applications online at vote.pa.gov or by paper application. As of yesterday, they have processed all ballot applications received through Monday. They have approved 39,004 vote-by-mail applications for the Primary, which is 16,610 added from last week's total. Of those applications processed so far, 18,845 are paper applications, and 20,159 are electronic applications.

The Voter Registration Unit Report for the election cycle to date, they have processed 64,431 registration applications, of which 3,600 were paper. They have sent out 42,389 ID cards.

Data, Imaging and Correspondence Units are working on mail-in apps -- time stamping, sorting, batching and

processing -- as well as processing
registrations. Documents are making
street list districts, full ward sets,
and working on the mail.

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The Warehouse Unit, they are done with the post-Election functionality test. They are completing any repairs they found doing the test. They are also doing preventative maintenance on all of the locks on each of the machines.

The Polling Place Unit -- the Polling Place Unit employees are currently out inspecting polling sites that are so far locked down for this upcoming election. They are going out and making sure that no modifications were made that might hamper space along with testing outlets and making sure there is adequate lighting.

The report from the Election Board Unit, the online training: 77 poll workers did online training. Confirmed poll workers for this upcoming election

is 1,432. They are at the United Lutheran Seminary this week. Monday's totals, there were 60 in-person people that came out for the training, and last night's number was 51. A total scheduled for in-person trainings is 891 so far to date. And that's all I have, Commissioners.

COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Thank you, Joe.

We will now proceed to new business. On February 23rd, 2022, the Pennsylvania Supreme Court announced the petition calendar for the congressional and statewide candidates, but not state legislative offices. For congressional and statewide candidates, the first date to circulate and file nomination petitions was Friday, February 25, 2022. And the last date to circulate and file is March 15, 2022. The order did not specify if this calendar applies to candidates in Democratic and Republican City Committee. On Thursday, the

1	Pennsylvania Department of State filed a
2	request for clarification to the Court's
3	February 23rd order requesting that the
4	local committee petitions coincide with
5	the state legislative races. On Friday
6	morning, Delaware County sought to
7	intervene requesting that the local
8	committee petitions coincide with
9	congressional and statewide candidates.
10	This has caused 67 counties to
11	essentially do 67 different things.
12	Some have not released petitions. Some
13	have told candidates to begin
14	circulating last week. Out of an
15	abundance of caution, we made the
16	petitions available with an explanation
17	of the situation. We expected the order
18	to be clarified shortly, at least no
19	later than yesterday afternoon. It is
20	now Wednesday, and there has not been
21	any clarification from the Court.
22	Candidates for committee person are in
23	limbo. They don't know if they should
24	start circulating because the Court

1 could rule that those signatures don't 2 count, and they will have to go back out 3 again. I was a committee person for 30 4 years. I can tell you it is hours of 5 conversations around neighbors' kitchen 6 tables to get those signatures, but 7 every day that passes is another day 8 closer to that March 15th deadline. 9 What do they do? There is real 10 confusion out there. Our phones are 11 ringing off the hook. I have people who 12 text me every day asking for an update 13 that I do not have. All this for a 14 volunteer position. They deserve 15 clarity. They deserve to know what 16 their petition calendar is. This is a 17 matter that has arisen to great concern 18 within the last 24 hours because we were 19 surprised that yesterday ended without 2.0 the Supreme Court issuing a ruling. In 21 fact, this continued right up until this 22 very minute that this meeting began. 23 For that reason, it was not included in 24 the agenda posted to the website prior

1	to 24 hours before the meeting.
2	Therefore, I would like to make a motion
3	to amend today's agenda to add a motion
4	requesting that the Supreme Court of
5	Pennsylvania issue a response to the
6	Department of State's application for
7	clarification in Carter V Chapman
8	regarding the election calendar for
9	party offices as soon as possible.
10	COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.
11	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Commissioner
12	Bluestein, please call the roll.
13	COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN:
14	Commissioner Deeley?
15	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Aye.
16	COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote
17	aye.
18	Commissioner Sabir?
19	COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.
20	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: The motion to
21	add a motion to today's agenda has
22	passed unanimously with Deeley,
23	Bluestein and Sabir all voting "aye."
24	Thank you. That item shall be added to

1	the agenda. And in accordance with the							
2	Sunshine Act, staff shall post an							
3	amended agenda to the website and City							
4	Hall Room 142 within one business day of							
5	this meeting.							
6	I now motion that we request that							
7	the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania issue							
8	a response to the Department of State's							
9	Application for Clarification in Carter							
10	V Chapman regarding the election							
11	calendar for party offices as soon as							
12	possible.							
13	COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.							
14	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Commissioner							
15	Bluestein, please call the roll.							
16	COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN:							
17	Commissioner Deeley?							
18	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Aye.							
19	COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote							
20	aye.							
21	Commissioner Sabir?							
22	COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.							
23	COMMISSIONER DEELEY: The motion							
24	asking the Supreme Court to respond to							

the Department of State Application for
Clarification has passed unanimously
with Deeley, Bluestein and Sabir all
voting "aye."

COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Commissioner
Sabir, do you have any items to be added
to the agenda?
COMMISSIONER SABIR: Yes, I do.
Good morning. March is Women's
History Month commemorating and
encouraging the study, observance and
celebration of the vital role that women
in America hold. I would like to also
applaud the efforts of Harriet Tubman,
Eleanor Roosevelt, the passage of the
19th Amendment, and Ketanji Brown
Jackson for Senate confirmation to be
the first African-American woman
confirmed to the United States Supreme
Court.
