5 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning. I  
6 call the meeting of October 07, 2020, to  
7 order. First I have an announcement. The  
8 Philadelphia City Commissioners met virtually  
9 and in person and executive session on Sunday,  
10 October 04, 2020, to meet with counsel in  
11 order to receive information on ongoing  
12 litigation.

13 We will now move to public comment.

14 First, if anyone is here to testify on  
15 polling places, I ask that you please wait  
16 until the new business part of the meeting  
17 when we will be considering polling place  
18 changes.

19 We will now move to public comment.

20 Commenters shall state where they live or if  
21 they are not a resident of Philadelphia, that  
22 they are a Philadelphia taxpayer.

23 Public comment is not an opportunity  
24 for dialogue or Q and A. It is public

1 comment. The chance for you to tell us what  
2 you think. Each speaker shall have two  
3 minutes however I may extend this time at my  
4 discretion.

5 All public comments must be relevant or  
6 germane toward business. Finally it is my  
7 responsibility to preserve the order and  
8 decorum of the meetings as such profane,  
9 slanderous, discriminatory or personal attacks  
10 will not be tolerated.

11 Anyone wishing to offer public comment  
12 please step forward.

13 MS. FRANCINE: My name is Francine. I  
14 live at 900 John F. Kennedy Boulevard,  
15 19003-818. I am concerned that there may be  
16 great litigation to slow down the count for  
17 the ballots soon after the election day.

18 I propose that you consider for people  
19 who have received mail-in ballots but haven't  
20 mailed them in that at the satellite offices  
21 you have three locks that are documented. How  
22 somebody with a mail-in ballot brought it to  
23 the satellite office has disposed of their  
24 ballot.

1                   This might perhaps allow the most  
2                   conservative Board of Election Judges to keep  
3                   those ballots segregated and accept those  
4                   ballots at the class and get them voted early.

5                   These are the things that I would  
6                   propose so that the satellite offices aren't  
7                   overrun. One bring your ballot and your ID.  
8                   Show it to the person at the desk. There's a  
9                   lot of us who got a mail-in ballot and you  
10                  need to decide whether at that point the  
11                  person can deposit a marked mail-in ballot  
12                  with the aid of the clerk properly mandated  
13                  and that is why you need an ID.

14                  So an ID'd person with a ballot or if  
15                  it's better and more defensible to have that  
16                  ballot destroyed and print a new ballot in the  
17                  office that's logging the destruction of the  
18                  ballot by the clerk is again signing in a  
19                  notebook and again obviously there is a  
20                  logging of the new ballot given to the person  
21                  for disposal as it is usually done in the  
22                  satellite office.

23                  If all of them -- all those ballots and  
24                  all of that logging is segregated there's a

1 chance that that whole class of ballots might  
2 have to be counted early because an ID has  
3 been shone and none one can claim a ballot --  
4 wasn't that person holding the ballot. Please  
5 do that and publicize it if you can.

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. Anyone  
7 here to offer public comment?

8 MR. POLLACK: Good morning  
9 Commissioners. My name is Rabbi Michael  
10 Pollack. I live near Melrose Diner in South  
11 Philly.

12 I'm a resident of Philadelphia and a  
13 cofounder of MarchOnHarrisburg. We are a  
14 coalition of Protect Our Vote Philadelphia.  
15 We focus on voting rights, ending bribery in  
16 Pennsylvania and all across the Commonwealth.

17 I'm happy to be here today to simply  
18 say thank you. The action that you have taken  
19 to reduce the possibility that anyone can say  
20 Philadelphia has frauded the elections . POV  
21 Philly recently set to open in 66 other  
22 counties in Pennsylvania.

23 A letter asking each Election Board to  
24 save the digital ballot images as required by

1 federal and state public records law. It is  
2 especially important for the Presidential  
3 Election that all counties retain all their  
4 digital ballot images. Digital images of  
5 ballots are produced both in person and  
6 mail-in voting.

7 The importance of preserving ballot  
8 images and not (inaudible) should elections in  
9 any county be challenged. The digital ballot  
10 would serve as a more essential tool to  
11 confirm the ballots correctly.

12 The Philadelphia Wards is one of the  
13 few wards across the state that responded  
14 positively saying that you do save these  
15 ballot images. We have also asked the  
16 Secretary of State Department to direct all  
17 counties to save their digital ballot images  
18 as well. Our Harrisburg Protect Our Vote  
19 Philadelphia would like to thank you for  
20 adopting this policy, which will increase  
21 public confidence in the upcoming election.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you.

23 MS. MCCARTHY: Good morning,  
24 Commissioners. My name is Miriam McCarthy

1 (ph) and I'm a resident of Philadelphia and a  
2 member of Protect Our Vote Philly. This  
3 morning we have a couple suggestions for the  
4 Board.

5 One is voters are showing up to  
6 satellite offices to drop off their completed  
7 ballots between 9 and 11:30 because they're  
8 not checking to see what time the satellite  
9 offices are open because they assume they're  
10 open during regular business hours. We would  
11 like to propose that we open the offices a  
12 little bit early at 9 o'clock so that we don't  
13 risk disenfranchising those people trying to  
14 drop off their ballots. It would only be a  
15 few more hours of pay for one person, per  
16 site, per day. If you would do that please.

17 Another suggestion is the Board is only  
18 being minimally compliant with election day by  
19 the election code by putting up the minimum of  
20 two notification posters at each polling  
21 location that is proposed to be moved. Please  
22 provide an earlier disclosure regarding new  
23 polling locations including the announcements  
24 that you make about the polling places that



1           you're going to vote on today and in other  
2           meetings and in future elections. Just having  
3           one or two copies on the table for people to  
4           look at without telling us it's here. It's  
5           not asking a lot to know what polling places  
6           are going to be moved. So publishing what  
7           you're going to vote on ahead of a meeting  
8           here would be very helpful.

9                        Last, we would like to suggest that at  
10           the satellite offices you have a sign that  
11           says this is a satellite office so people can  
12           find it. Sometimes the people have a little  
13           bit of trouble. That would be great if you  
14           could help with those suggestions. Thank you.

15                      CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. Anyone  
16           here to provide public comment? Anyone else?

17                      MR. GARELLA: Good morning. My name is  
18           Rich Garella. I am a voter of Philadelphia  
19           and a member of Protect Our Vote Philly.

20                      First I want to mention that your last  
21           public commenting executive session this  
22           morning once again violated the Sunshine Act.  
23           More specific about the litigation -- the  
24           executive session posed a problem.

1                   Secondly, thank you for putting these  
2 meetings on live stream. We hope in the  
3 future that it will also be possible for  
4 people to make public comments remotely in  
5 case they're compromised and need to do that.

6                   The main topic is that the Election is  
7 four weeks away and we are more and more  
8 concerned that our election is in danger of  
9 legal challenge. In our open letter to every  
10 Commissioner on this Board we need legal  
11 procedures. We make many specific  
12 recommendations. So far you haven't  
13 officially responded in any way, let alone  
14 done any of the things to make this election  
15 less vulnerable.

16                   In our statement on the theft of the  
17 laptop and USB last Tuesday, we urge you to do  
18 a series assessment and mitigation with the  
19 help of independent expert cyber security and  
20 infrastructure security agency.

21                   A looter walked right into the same  
22 warehouse just as we did last November.  
23 Security needs to be end-to-end not just at  
24 the warehouse. That would make this election

1 a lot less vulnerable.

2 One thing that needs to be secure is  
3 the un-voted ballots. In past elections,  
4 machines were simply uncontrolled. There has  
5 been no routine check on division results to  
6 confirm there were no extra votes. We also  
7 don't see any oversight on ballot counting.

8 If you address these issues, you can  
9 improve ballot votes are legitimate and make  
10 this election less vulnerable.

11 We've documented how this violates the  
12 Sunshine Act. This reflects and deprives you  
13 from the public. It also can also be  
14 challenged.

15 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Two minutes.

16 MR. GARELLA: We are only talking about  
17 these problems because they need to be fixed  
18 and they can be fixed.

19 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. Anyone  
20 else for public comment?

21 MS. FRANCINE: I would like to very  
22 quickly?

23 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: You already  
24 commented.

1 MS. FRANCINE: This is completely  
2 different. This has to deal with people with  
3 disabilities. May I make a comment regarding  
4 that protecting of ballots or if I'm not  
5 allowed?

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I will allow it but  
7 it should be noted for the record that you get  
8 -- that each public commenter gets two minutes  
9 per visit.

10 MS. FRANCINE: Thank you. The past --  
11 our chair of the Commission for People with  
12 Disabilities. A blind person in my division  
13 who has said she's very concerned because our  
14 election location has changed. She is not --

15 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: -- if this is about  
16 polling places --

17 MS. FRANCINE: This is general  
18 question. If there is a way to assure that  
19 all consideration of the election for blind  
20 voters in particular in favor of the new  
21 issues that you got to have the opportunity to  
22 directly vote on a machine prior to the  
23 election and securely without assistance in  
24 some locations over time instead of squashing

1 it.

2 The second thing is I want to make sure  
3 there's sufficient provisional ballots and  
4 sufficient challenges at the polling places so  
5 if there is a major interference, a challenge  
6 from poll watchers the field of that would not  
7 have a running out and having to stop the  
8 election waiting for more of those supplies to  
9 come to each polling place.

10 The last thing I want to point out is  
11 about the security of a non-intimidation act  
12 of mailboxes and drop boxes. I was approached  
13 by a group of people including a friend of  
14 mine who is a protective Republican member.  
15 On the day of election at the drop box on  
16 June 1st, I was not interfered with, he didn't  
17 challenge me at the drop box. I am concerned  
18 about things going into the drop box that can  
19 spoil that.

20 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. Is  
21 anyone else here for public comment? Hearing  
22 none. We'll ask the Secretary for a report on  
23 emailed public comments.

24 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Good morning. The

1 Commission has received all public comments  
2 emailed to our office by 9:45 a.m. today.

3 These comments were shared with each  
4 Commissioner and their deputies at 10:00 a.m.  
5 today. These comments were also provided to  
6 each Commissioner at the beginning of the  
7 meeting and are available for the public to  
8 view at the public comment table. We have  
9 reviewed two public comments. One public  
10 comment was from Steve Masters and the second  
11 public comment from Protect Our Vote Philly.  
12 I have reviewed these public comments and ask  
13 that they be moved into the record.

14 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I also reviewed  
15 these public comments and would ask them to be  
16 moved into record.

17 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I have also  
18 reviewed these and thereby ask that these  
19 comments be moved into the record.

22 identification.)

23 \* \* \* \* \*

24 We will now proceed with old business from a

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1 report from Executive Director Joe Lynch.

2 MR. LYNCH: Good morning,  
3 Commissioners. From the report from last  
4 week's County Board of Elections, we have  
5 processed 327,883 absentee and mail-in  
6 applications.

7 Absentee -- there was 30,921, 1,835  
8 paper, 29,086 online.

9 Mail-ins we had 293,247, 128,086 paper,  
10 165,161 online.

11 Civilian overseas 990.

12 Federal voters 2,271.

13 Military 454.

14 For a total outstanding ballot  
15 applications is about 47,500, total  
16 outstanding ballot applications excluding  
17 estimated duplicate applications is around  
18 22,500.

19 Our registration unit to date has done  
20 244,193 registration of which 37,200 of them  
21 were paper. We are up to date on all the  
22 registration applications.

23 Polling place unit -- the total as of  
24 today, Tuesday, October 6th, canvassing and

1 relocating nine divisions are remaining.  
2 Divisions that are solved, 1,694, and there's  
3 99.47 percent of 1,703 divisions. The state  
4 number of sites confirmed is 714.

5 The Election Board unit confirmed voter  
6 or confirmed board workers is 7,208,  
7 unconfirmed is 1,307 and total of board  
8 workers contributing as of today is 2,751.  
9 That's it. That's all I have.

10 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you Joe. We  
11 will now hear any public comment related to  
12 polling place changes. Please come forward  
13 and state your name for the record.

14 MR. ECKHART: This is Brian Eckhart  
15 (ph) 39, 32.

16 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: 3932? 39 ward,  
17 32nd division?

18 MR. ECKHART: Correct.

19 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Proceed.

20 MR. ECKHART: 3932 moved from East  
21 Passyunk to Bok Building. We would like this  
22 move to occur after November 3rd seeing it is  
23 too late to happen now. Our concerns are at  
24 this point it's been decided by last August it



1 would have been more easily involved and would  
2 have plenty of time to get the word out.

3 Less than 30 days before the election  
4 is not suitable enough time. Supposedly  
5 someone from Bok approached the Commission and  
6 requested there be a polling station. After a  
7 site survey, the Commission said yes.

8 This is a second story. I was told the  
9 original said a ward member requested a move.  
10 I can only believe this was said -- I have an  
11 email from the Board requesting a move not  
12 take place this close to the election as well  
13 as a few others.

14 I also questioned why we're not given  
15 input on this originally when it came up. I  
16 was told in an email sent to the Board leader.  
17 He states did not receive them.

18 I was also told I should receive the  
19 email but the office did not have my email on  
20 record. My email is matter of record along  
21 with my phone number which used to be on the  
22 City Commissioner's website before you guys  
23 drop those off this Judge of Election.

24 Either way, I believe it is too close

1 to get the word out for this division. We  
2 missed so much time and we are requesting this  
3 be postponed until after the election. I also  
4 have a copy of emails back and forth with  
5 Donna Bishop, who is Election Supervisor  
6 showing that the Election Board has my email.  
7 She reached out and contacted me.

8 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you, sir.  
9 Anyone else here to comment on a polling  
10 place? Hearing no more, we will proceed with  
11 Charles Stroman for a report on the polling  
12 places.

13 MR. STROMAN: Good morning,  
14 Commissioners. We would like to move 113  
15 divisions listed on this sheet in front of you  
16 from the consolidated polling places to the  
17 new locations for the 2020 general election.

18 The copy of the list has been given to  
19 each Commissioner and is available on the  
20 public comment table. I ask that this be  
21 moved into the record or if you would I can  
22 read through all 113 changes.

23 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Charlie, before we  
24 make a motion. Can you just tell me anything

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1 about the first commenter's concern about the  
2 39th ward 32nd division?

3 MR. STROMAN: Yes, I can.

4 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Can you tell me  
5 also what ward East Passyunk is in and what  
6 ward the Fox School is in?

7 MR. STROMAN: Fox School sits in the  
8 39th ward and East Passyunk sits in the 1st  
9 ward. The division 32 the gentleman is  
10 talking about actually jumps over one division  
11 to vote the furthest away from East Passyunk.

12 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. I make  
13 a motion that the polling places as outlined  
14 by Charles Stroman be moved into the record.

15 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I second.

16 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: All in favor?

17 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Aye.

19 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Aye.

20 \* \* \* \* \*

21 (Whereupon, Election-2 was marked for  
22 identification.)

1 MR. STROMAN: Commissioners voted the  
2 divisions into the record and a copy will be  
3 given to the stenographer.

4 Thank you. Also notice of replaced  
5 2020 general primary polling place for the  
6 2020 general election place and within the  
7 division.

8 If the changes are approved, the  
9 updated list will be on Philadelphiavotes.com  
10 and is a source for each of the division. I  
11 ask that the polling place for 113 divisions  
12 listed on the sheets in front of you be  
13 approved. That's all I have.

14 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. So I  
15 have some motions but before I move my  
16 motions, I would just like to say I am  
17 thrilled that the Board of Commissioners can  
18 offer -- I need to make a motion to approve  
19 the changes that are listed on Mr. Stroman's  
20 list that he's providing.

21 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I second.

22 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Second.

23 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: All in favor? Aye.

24 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Aye.

1 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

2 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: So approved. As I  
3 was saying that we are able to offer  
4 additional options for voters. Satellite  
5 offices to temporary election offices.

6 We are doing -- trying to do all that  
7 we can.

8 It is my belief that it is better to be  
9 able to provide some services in all of them  
10 than to have them closed to all services for  
11 any length of time.

12 I would also add that this is not a  
13 money issue, it is a people issue.

14 So we are posting job opportunities on  
15 our website for those interested in working to  
16 help us within the satellite offices and as  
17 such I make the following motion.

18 For the openings of the satellite  
19 offices, the deputies are authorized to  
20 temporarily adjust the times and dates that  
21 these offices are open in order to open as  
22 many satellite locations as quickly as  
23 possible.

24 In addition, each of the approved

1 satellite office locations may be used to  
2 serve as a staff application and mail-in  
3 ballot drop off location if sufficient is  
4 available to provide other office services.  
5 Do I have a second.

6 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Second.

7 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: All in favor? Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye. I placed my  
9 vote two weeks ago.

10 We approved to open up the satellite  
11 locations as soon as we possibly can with  
12 staffing and I think that we should expand our  
13 hours.

14 I think that we can do more creative  
15 things. We can possibly have a career fair,  
16 we can possibly hire an HR consultant, we can  
17 work with media-organizations so we can get  
18 the staff to open up these satellite  
19 locations.

20 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you all in  
21 favor of the motion? Aye. Motion carries.

22 I made the following motion: The  
23 County Board of Elections has placed drop  
24 boxes outside of our offices at City Hall and

1           520 North Columbus Boulevard. Furthermore the  
2           County Board of Election shall place  
3           additional drop boxes throughout the city at  
4           locations other than satellite election  
5           offices.

6                     The following number will be placed in  
7           each region.

8                     Center City -- two.

9                     Far Northeast -- two.

10                    Lower Northeast -- one.

11                    North -- one.

12                    Northwest -- three.

13                    River -- one.

14                    Southeast -- two.

15                    Southwest -- one.

16                    Upper North -- one.

17                    West -- one.

18                    The exact locations shall be the  
19           Department of State's requirements and shall  
20           be agreed to between the Deputies controlling  
21           the locations. The Deputies shall arrange for  
22           installation of the drop boxes, shall record  
23           the location and installations at the meeting  
24           -- next public meeting of the Board of

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1 Elections and shall publicize the drop box  
2 locations for when they are installed and  
3 ready to be released to the general public on  
4 Philadelphiavotes.com. Do I have a second.

5 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Second.

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: All in favor?

7 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Motion granted. I  
10 have no for new business. Commissioners?

11 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I have none.

12 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I have none.

13 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Hearing no further  
14 old business and no new business, this meeting  
15 is adjourned to the call of the Chair. Thank  
16 you.

### **Burglary at election warehouse raises significant security concerns, but they can be addressed effectively**

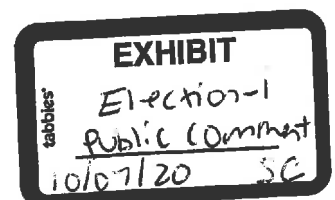
As initially reported by [KYW Newsradio](#) and the [Philadelphia Inquirer](#) on Wednesday, a laptop computer belonging to an ES&S employee was stolen Tuesday night from a Philadelphia Board of Elections warehouse, along with "several" USB drives that are used to program the ES&S ExpressVote XL voting machines. The story quickly went national, feeding concerns about the integrity of our voting systems.

We hope that these items are recovered quickly and that it can be verified that they were not compromised in any way. *Call police at [215-686-TIPS](tel:215-686-TIPS) with any information.*

**Protect Our Vote Philly calls on the Board of Elections to immediately bring in trusted, independently qualified experts to perform a comprehensive risk assessment, and to request assistance from the U.S. [Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Agency \(CISA\)](#) to develop and execute a mitigation plan.**

Although we trust that ES&S has cut off the laptop's access to their company network, whatever data was stored locally on the laptop must be considered compromised. The Board stated that there was no election material on the laptop. A comprehensive review is necessary to determine if there was any information on the laptop — election material or otherwise — that could be used to harm ES&S, Philadelphia, or other ES&S customers.

For example, any credentials, such as usernames and passwords, stored on the device could allow unauthorized access to privileged systems. Casual information such as personnel contact lists or schedules could be used to



facilitate social engineering or phishing attacks. A full accounting will allow ES&S and the Board to mitigate these risks and prevent future damage, as well as strengthen public trust in the election process and results.

The ES&S USB drives have security protections, but the data may have included cryptographic material used to protect the integrity of the election. In that case the Board must immediately generate new encryption keys for this election and reprogram and retest any machines prepared previously.

**The Board of Elections must also immediately adopt comprehensive protocols to protect the physical security of voting machines, blank ballots, and other election materials.** Last November, POVPhilly documented serious security lapses, including at this very warehouse, and notified the Board and others up to the Secretary of the Commonwealth. Performing a security review and quickly implementing the recommendations must be a top priority.

Whatever happens, we urge every eligible voter to cast their vote. Uncast votes **never** count. **Vote.**

Dear Chairwoman Deeley and Commissioners Sabir and Schmidt:

The undersigned are the elected Democratic Committeepersons and the elected Judges of Election for Ward 9, Divisions 14 and 15.

We are unable to appear in person to present testimony at the hearing called by the City Commissioners to consider a request to change our polling place from Allens Lane Art Center to Houston School and therefore request that this letter be entered into the record as our written testimony in strong support of this polling location change.

Section 527(a) of the Pennsylvania Election Code requires the City Commissioners to locate polling places inside schoolhouses, municipal buildings or other public buildings wherever possible. That section states in relevant part:

In selecting polling places, **the county board of elections shall, wherever possible and practicable, select schoolhouses**, municipal buildings or rooms, or other public buildings for that purpose. Any board of public education or school directors, or county or the municipal authorities shall, upon request of the county board, make arrangements for the use of school property, or of county or municipal property for polling places. In selecting polling places, the county board of elections shall make every effort to select polling places that provide all electors with an environment that is free from intimidation and violence.

25 P.S. § 2727(a)

The traditional location for the polling place for Ward 9 Divisions 14 and 15 is another Municipal building known as the Allens Lane Art Center. We do not consider Allens Lane Art Center to be safe for both voters and poll workers during the COVID-19 pandemic because the physical layout of the building will not allow voters and poll workers to maintain safe social distancing protocols in place under the emergency declarations issued by Governor Wolf and Mayor Kenney.

- To maintain a safe environment there must be separate entrances and exits for voters but Allens Lane Art Center has only one narrow entrance and exit which all voters would have to use before and after voting.

- Both poll workers and voters will be put at high risk while inside the polling location because the spaces where voting takes place are too small to maintain safe social distance

We considered several alternative locations and the Houston School was the consensus choice of the elected leadership of both divisions for the following reasons:

- Houston School is located just a few blocks away from voters' homes so voters will be able to easily walk to the polling place
- The school also has ample parking for those voters who wish to drive to the polls
- There are multiple entrances and exits available for voters to use
- The school has a large space available to use for the polling place so safe social distancing can be easily maintained
- The school has served as a polling place in the past
- The school district has agreed to allow the use of the school as a polling location again

We understand there are traffic challenges because of the ongoing construction of the Allens Lane bridge and various road closures near the intersection of Cresheim Road and Allens Lane. We are willing to work with the near neighbors to develop traffic solutions. We plan to create signage to guide motorists driving to the polls and expect to have volunteers stationed outside the polls who can direct cars. We also plan to educate our constituents about the best ways to travel to Houston School via walking or vehicle.

For all of these reasons, we strongly urge the City Commissioners to approve this request to change the polling location for Ward 9 Divisions 14 and 15 from Allens Lane Art Center to the Houston School.
